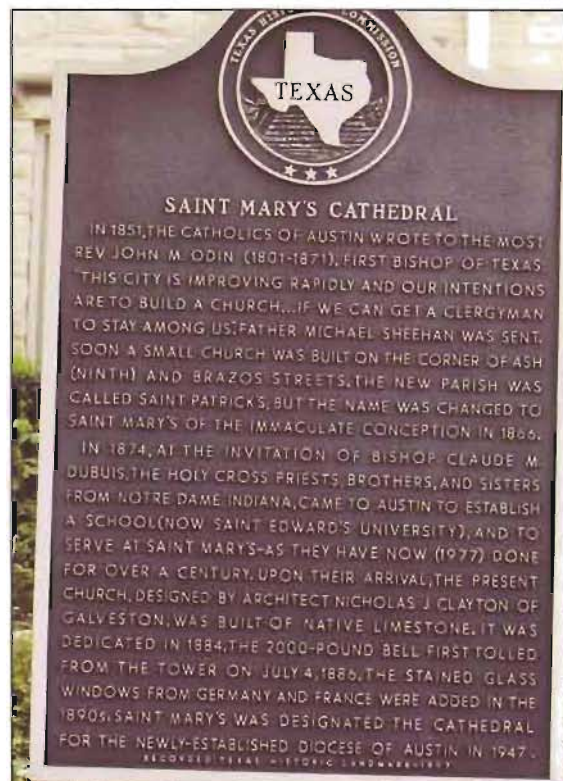


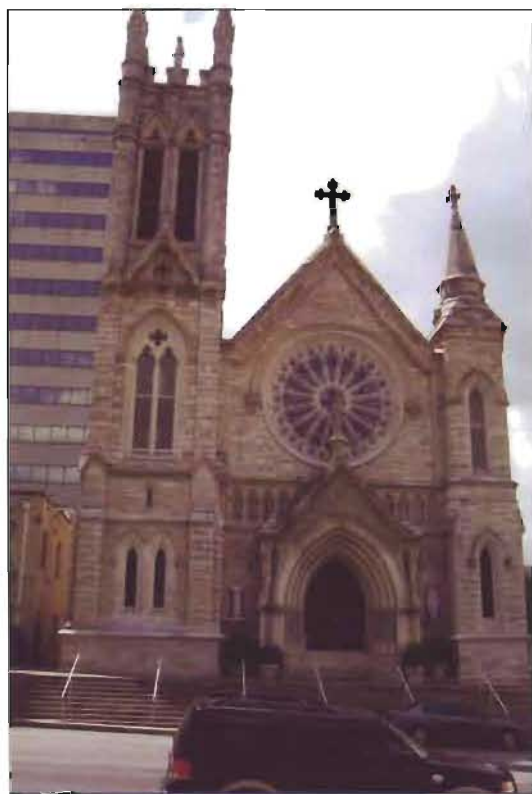


Stained glass windows in the sanctuary. Note that they are very similar to those in Sacred Heart Basilica as they were made by the same Carmelite sisters in France.

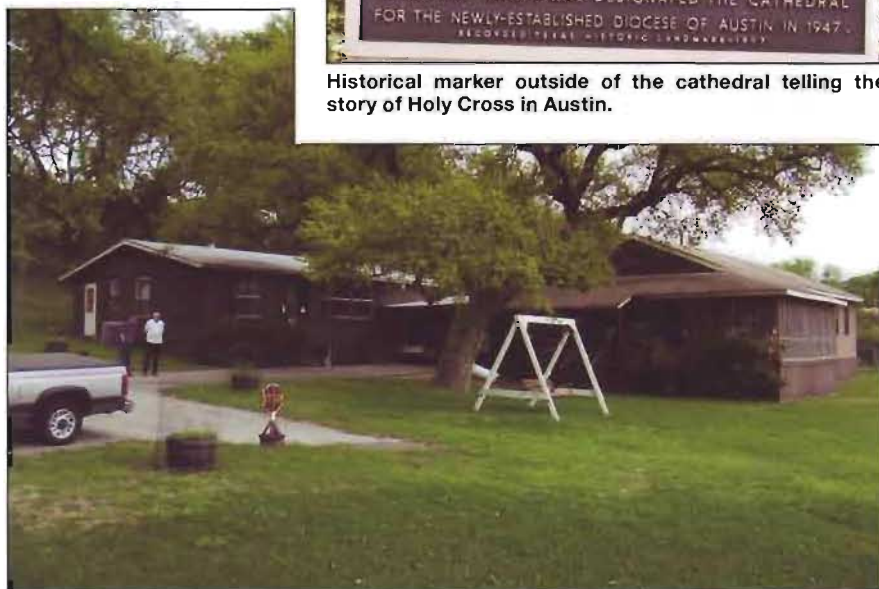


Historical marker outside of the cathedral telling the story of Holy Cross in Austin.

Sacred Heart Parish, New Orleans

Sacred Heart Parish is unique to us, as Holy Cross actually owns the property. Holy Cross has been in New Orleans since 1848 and we have served at Sacred Heart Parish since 1879.

The parish has been closed since Katrina due to substantial flood damage to the Church and other parish buildings. In addition to that perhaps

only 10% to 15% of the neighborhood homes are currently livable.

It is uncertain when or if the neighborhood will ever recover. The Province, in consultation with the Archdiocese will need to determine whether or not the parish will re-open as there are several other area churches nearby.

About ten years ago, the former parish high school, grade school and convent were converted to low-income

senior housing called Malta Square. Malta Square was leased from Holy Cross and developed by Willwoods, a Catholic organization, led by Fr. Tom Chambers, that operates about 15 such properties for the elderly in New Orleans. Through the efforts of Fr. Tom, Willwoods has obtained the financing to begin the major repairs needed on Malta Square and work began last March.

OBITUARY

We oftentimes meet individuals whom we admire for their ability to stick with something over a long period of time. Such an individual was Fr. Dan Coughlin. Fr. Dan was regular with his schedule of work, prayer and exercise his entire life. He did not vary in his routine or in his dress. He was always polite and always on time and always had a twinkle in his Irish eyes.

Fr. Daniel C. Coughlin, C.S.C., passed away Sunday, November 18, 2007 surrounded by his brothers in community and the wonderful staff of Holy Cross House.

Fr. Dan was born November 23, 1914 in Boston, MA to John and Barbara (Cooke) Coughlin. After attending public grade schools he graduated from the Boston High School of Commerce in 1931 and then attended classes at the Bentley School of Accounting and Finance also in Boston, MA.

While working as a clerk for the Boston Police Department, he applied for admission to Holy Cross and entered Holy Cross Seminary at Notre Dame in September of 1940. After finishing the novitiate and taking first vows in August of 1943, he returned to Notre Dame and graduated with a degree in philosophy in 1946. After four years of theology at Holy Cross College in Washington, D.C., Fr. Dan was ordained to the priesthood at the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on June 6, 1950.

In his first assignment, Fr. Dan spent five years at Sacred Heart Church in New Orleans followed by ten years, 1955-65, on the Holy Cross Mission Band. He assisted for the next two years at St. Joseph's parish, South Bend, then for five years in California giving retreats from 1967-1972. Moving his center of operations to the Holy Cross Mission House in North Dartmouth, MA, in 1972 he continued in retreat work until 1975.

Accepting the opportunity to assist at St. John the Evangelist parish in New York City, he stayed there until being assigned to Christ the King Parish in South Bend in 1979. In 1985 he moved across town to St. Casimir Parish and nine years later went to St. Jude for one year. Beginning in 1996, Fr. Dan lived and assisted at St. Stanislaus Parish in South Bend, IN. In June of 2001 he moved to Holy Cross House.

On Tuesday night at the Moreau Seminary Chapel, Fr. Ken Molinaro, assistant provincial, presided at Fr. Dan's wake service and preached the following eulogy.

This is truly an honor to preside at the wake service for Fr. Dan Coughlin. We spent four years together at Christ the King Parish (1981-1985). Fr. Joe Fey was pastor. I served as principal of the school.

I remember spending many a Saturday evening with Fr. Dan. After the Saturday evening Mass at the parish, Frs. Joe Fey and John Dupuis would usually go out to dinner. Fr. Dan and I would generally stay back at the house, sharing a bowl of soup or leftovers. We would sit and talk. It was there that I really grew to know Fr. Dan and developed a deep appreciation and respect for him!

In my initial experience of living with him at Christ the King, there was a sternness about him that had me, as a young priest, sitting up straight at the table and... most definitely... very mindful about what I said... especially if it had anything to do with church matters. Just his look could silence me very quickly!

I wasn't alone in that feeling. Fr. Dan projected a "no-nonsense" approach that was certainly picked up by the school children. I recall one occasion when our 8th graders were preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation. Each student was scheduled to have an interview with one of the members of the pastoral staff. The students assigned to Fr. Dan were terrified. They worried about what he might ask them. Later in the day I met with the junior high teachers to hear about the Confirmation interviews. The teachers reported that the students were positive about their meeting with Fr. Dan.

Although they did note that his most pointed question was to ask if they thought about religious life or priesthood. To which
